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Redesign Workshop:

Transition Year students took part in a workshop run by James Fahy from Redesign Ireland. The aim of this workshop was to get them to become more environmentally conscious about their consumer choices and to be aware of their daily carbon footprint.

This course is designed to aid students in applying their learning to real-life situations and fostering problem-solving skills for real-world problems as the Earth continues to heat in the coming decades.

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• Firstly he showed us videos and photos of the animals he saw on the places where he had been in the last years: Costa Rica, Brazil, Malaysia, Canada, Mexico, Peru, California, Colombia.

- We played a game in groups of 4: He asked a question and we had 30 seconds to answer, then one of each group played rock paper or scissors and who won was the first saying one of his answer, then we got points depending the answer.
- He asked us questions about biodiversity, gases contaminants, sea issues...

• We watched a video about earth, why is so special, what was the first thing that was created in the earth(bacteria).

• We were assigned to each group a sphere and we had to talk about its important, function.

- We played a Kahoot.
- After break we talked about anthology, pollution in the world.
- We watched a video about how humans are destroying the planet.
- Then we played again kahoot.
- *He showed us a video about global extremes, and we talked about natural disasters, climate change.*
- We completed two questionnaires about our carbon footprint.
- We did an atmosphere and environment quiz.

• Finally, we made a video in groups about some of the topics we learnt during the class. In my opinion it was one of the most interesting topics we have done, and I would strongly recommend it.


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
